Attendance, Participation & In-Class Activities (140 points):

"Documented" means written proof, such as a letter from a physician in the case of medical emergencies.
- If you know before an exam that you cannot make it on the scheduled date (i.e. court date, military duty, or university sports event- for athletes only), see me and you <u>may</u> be allowed to take the exam early, but you will not be allowed to take the exam <u>after</u> the scheduled date for <u>any</u> reason that you knew about before the exam. - Entries do **not** have to be typed However, if I cannot read your handwriting & the presentation is sloppy points will be deducted
- For your weekly entries, compare the way different media sources and/or reporters cover the same event during a day or week.
- Examine articles that deal with any aspect of American government. Feel free to include political cartoons if you wish.
- 3 "spot checks" will be offered during semester on the day of exam reviews.

- Begin with Week 1 (Sunday, August 21 to Saturday, August 27) End with Week 15 (Sunday, November 27 to Saturday, December 3)
