### Course Goals

This course will introduce students to the study of African politics and the diversity of peoples, ideas, cultures and political practices across the continent. We will examine the impact of the colonial experience and cold-war rivalries on the crises of postcolonial political development and explore the ways in which African populations, political movements and states have responded. The course will cover a number of the political issues faced by African countries and their leaders; we will also use the experience of Zimbabwe as a case study for exploring these issues in more depth. Each student will also research another country and share the results with the class.

#### Major Assignments and Deadlines

The major assignment for this course is a report on a sub-Saharan African country (other than Zimbabwe). You will prepare an 8-10 page research paper analyzing current political problems and challenges in your chosen country, due Friday August I. All writing assignments must be typed, double-spaced, proofread and ON TIME. Late papers, if accepted, will receive a lower grade. There will be weekly reading quizzes with 5-10 multiple choice questions, as well as a final exam. Finally, you will have a map quiz in the third week of the course.

In addition to these major assignments, each day two or three students will present approximately three news stories about Africa to the class. The recommended source for news is the BBC's Africa section (http://news.bbc.co.uk/2/hi/africa/default.stm), but you may use any reputable newspaper or news source (if you have questions about what counts as "reputable," see me). Students will be chosen at random each day, and your readiness to discuss the news will be a factor in your participation grade.

## On-time Attendance

In a shortened course such as this, attendance is extremely important. We have only 16 class meetings, so a great deal of material will be covered in each one. Circumstances may require you to miss a class. In such case, the absence must be cleared with the instructor by phone or email. If you miss a class, it is your responsibility to contact classmates to find out what you missed. More than two unexcused absences will drop your final grade one letter.
