Seminar in International Relations (Ph.D. Level - Core)

The Paper(s)

Your main paper assignment will be a literature review or (*preferred*) advanced research paper (20+ pages) addressing any topic covered in this course. The research papers can either be completed with quantitative or qualitative methods. It is your choice, but the goal is for you to produce a paper that is of the standard of professional conference presentation.

A literature review covers the entire breath of scholarship on a certain issue. The goal is not to summarize existing findings, but to identify flaws and research gaps in your chosen area. What work needs to be done or what has been done wrong? A review should consult at least 20 articles and books. **All topics need to be approved by the professor.**

You will also have to complete one book review (6+ pages). The book covered should not be listed on the syllabus and should have been published since 2002. The goal of this paper is to place the book in the literature, summarize its contributions to the field, and discuss its shortcomings. You should not spend a lot of time summarizing the book, but in placing the findings in a wider context. **The professor needs to approve all books. Book reviews are due on Nov 2nd.**

Participation

Participation is simply showing up and contributing to class. Either asking questions during class or private conversations with the professor (if you are more comfortable with that) all count towards your participation grade. This is a Ph.D. level seminar and missing class is simply unacceptable. Every student should be able to contribute to a dialogue regarding the readings and current events.

In addition to normal participation, each student will be required to write a **three/four sentence summary** of each article/chapter assigned for that day. This assignment is due prior to the start of class. You will be asked to redo the summary if the assignment is not completed to a satisfactory degree. If the assignments and discussion is

not of a satisfactory level the professor reserves the right to change the class requirements and assign tests and utilize further evaluation tools.

The Readings

Every required reading is important. To grasp the details and arguments contained within it is recommended that one read most articles and books twice. Graduate courses are difficult and require a devotion to the subject material. The recommended readings are listed for those interested in a particular subject or those who will take the international relations preliminary exam at some time. To be successful in research, in teaching, and on the job market, one should be familiar with all readings listed - eventually. Successful students in this class will have read some of the recommend sources purely for self-enrichment or out of curiosity.

If most of class fails to complete the readings, I reserve the right to change the course requirements so that essay papers are due before each class to ensure full reading of the materials.
